On Thursday 9th December, I had booked the whole of the Theatre Royal in Lincoln so we could all watch this years pantomime 'Beauty & the Beast'.

Coaches left Pembroke promptly at 10.45am and we were all seated with snacks ready for an 11.30am show. The whole ambience of the theatre had been truly missed by many, and this small yet traditional theatre really didn't disappoint. Many of our students have never experienced a live show before.

The incredible cast including Jake Quickenden as Flash Hugo, took to the stage for the biggest and best traditional Christmas pantomime ever! We watched in awe as the story of the beautiful, intelligent Belle unfolded before our eyes, would she be able to save the Beast from his spell before the last rose petal fell?

Jake, who began his career as a footballer playing for Scunthorpe United, who later expanded his skill base as a contestant on the ninth and eleventh series of *The X Factor* in 2012 and 2014, before being runner-up in series 14 of *I'm a Celebrity...Get Me Out of Here!* In 2018, he won the tenth series of *Dancing on Ice*, and now he is the character who fails to woo Belle in the Pantomime. He was a very funny character and was able to heckle our school audience perfectly. In fact Miss Romain was the one who he had his eye on for the whole show.

It was wonderful to see the students watching the show from all angles of the Theatre. They shouted when required, they were mesmerised by the beautiful singing of the cast and were able to sing along to the modern pop songs incorporated into the script. It was fantastic and so many students both thanks us and told us it was 'amazing'.

We are proud to be able to provide whole school experiences like this for our students. Yes it broadens their cultural and social capital, but also from a careers perspective they could see the roles of everyone in the show and how they worked together to make create such a phenomenal performance. Passionate To Be Back In The Primary Schools Again

It has been great to be back in the primary schools since September. I had really missed the student interaction and although my youtube video projects were well received, it just wasn't the same as being there with the year 5&6 children; talking and creating and building relationships.

Every Wednesday afternoon (and some Fridays) have been jam packed with exciting primary projects. Year 6 at Cherry were reading 'Holes' by Louis Sachar and we created mixed media lizard work with a focus on textile techniques. Reepham year 6 came to Pembroke to create card models of WW2 tanks linking to their curriculum. This involved lots of measuring, cutting and assembling—at which they are all now very competent. I have been out to Bardney primary to deliver a drawing workshop to year 6. We talked about why we draw and looked at the drawing styles of a range of artists and designers to eliminate the stereotype of drawings having to look like photographs. The students drew in both pencil and charcoal after doing some quirky drawing exercises with their left hand, using tape and wire.

I have had many afternoons at Nettleham this term working with both year 5 and 6. Ancient Greeks were on the curriculum for year 5 and they asked for a drawing lesson and some sculpture. So we drew a sculpture of Zeus using careful tonal shading and blending, and the following week we sculpture heroic clay busts. Year 6 were studying South America and the Day of the Dead. I taught them how to make felt and they created some lovely decorative textile skull imagery.

Carlton academy requested a progression of the year 6 children's print skills. This was a tricky one to do with 60 children in 3 hours, so we went for oil pastel monoprints

which were very effective and both teachers and students enjoyed the process. Challenge was added through creative reflection or rotation repeat pattern making linking to the work of William Morris. I think I will be back at Carlton Academy working with year 5 in the Spring on Cam mechanisms—how exciting!

So with all these great primary links and learning being developed, alongside a very busy Open Evening back in September, its safe to say that Pembroke's reputation as the secondary school to be at, really is doing us justice. I think our year 7 spaces will be full every year now. Maybe I can retire early?



Its been an extremely busy module for fixtures. Here is a run down of our sporting highlights. We've had badminton against LSST on 19th November in league matches across the 8 boys, 10 boys, and 9/10 girls teams. The year 8 boys team were the overall winners. On 18th November, our year 7 boys football team played at the Priory City of Lincoln Academy, which would see them play in their first competitive league match since beating the Pembroke year 8s 4-3 before half term.

The boys were well up for the challenge! Pembroke came straight out of the starting blocks and took control early on and the fast start saw us go 1-0 up in the 6th minute by a lovely strike from Oliver Neal! It became a very close contest, but a few Pembroke mistakes saw Priory City take a 3-1 lead into half time. This wasn't the end though! A hearty half time team talk fired them up for a fight in the second half – our boys played some lovely football, and after some great play from Sid Goodale and both Phillipsons on the wings, Pembroke soon started to net a few more – we'd taken a 4-3 lead! Unfortunately with 10 minutes to go, a few gaps began to appear and City looked strong on the counter attack. What a performance to be proud of and a shed load of positivity to take from the game!

Our under 13's girls football team have repeatedly represented Pembroke tremendously competing in football tournaments against almost every school in Lincoln and Gainsborough. And yes we are just a bit proud to announce that they keep winning every game both as year 7 and 8 teams and together as under 13's. They are unstoppable and just incredible. Hope McClements, Ruby Walker, Beth Cussons, Phoebe Graves , Melody Pease, Amelia Chester, Maddison Cribb, Rosie Pease, Katie Pease, Lily Burns, Gracie Newitt and Alyssa Morar—these girls have beaten QEHS, NK, Will Farr, Priory City, SSPP and Branston to name a few.

Our under 14 boys football team faced a tough challenge against Spalding Academy in the first round of the county cup. Unfortunately they didn't make it through to the next round, but again as ever their #courageous and #passionate attitude for sport saw them do us proud regardless of the result.

On 9th December at the Lincoln and Gainsborough district Cross Country championships, hundreds of runners met from the 14 schools to race for the top positions which would qualify for the Lincolnshire County round in January at Burleigh House, Stamford. Our students were amazing. Thomas Pett finished 76th, Asher Phillipson 3rd and his brother Finnian Phillipson got 1st and was the race winner. Holly Urquhart was 26th, Alyssa Morar was in 25th place, Matthew Kent 4th, Daniel Outen 38th, James Outen 49th, Peter Rawsthorne 87th and Oliver Cooney was 1st and again won this race for the second time. mAmazing performances, 4 runners will qualify for the Lincolnshire County round (Oliver Cooney, Matthew Kent, Asher Phillipson, Finnian Phillipson).

Wise Sculpture Project











In order to mark 'lockdown', a period where Pembroke Academy stepped up to ensure every single student on our school roll was cared for both academically and emotionally. We want to commemorate this moment in our history. We have some funding to spend on this and want to ensure it benefits our students in many ways.

The feelings of isolation, loneliness and upset were felt by many of our students and staff, but our school community is special and we kept one another going through the tough times. We want to mark the occasion when restrictions were lifted and we could function together as a school community again.

The national 'gap' created in education by lockdown is not only academic, but emotional, social and cultural too. We want a project that gives our students some ownership of something, so they feel they have made a difference somehow to our school site and are leaving a legacy behind.

After sourcing possible artists/sculptors we have settled on local metal sculptor James Sutton. We needed a sculptor whose work incorporated lots of smaller elements to fit our needs. We invited James Sutton into school to discuss the project and share ideas with me. James lives in Saxilby and has a workshop in Harpswell, so the locality works well for us as travel time is not included in the cost. James was very keen to be involved and shared his ideas of how to involve our students. Working with metal is a dangerous and bespoke craft, so we needed ways to allow students to take ownership and an important role.

Here is our time frame. We will be keeping you posted of progress on our social media sites too.

Monday 15th Nov – virtual video task where I launched the sculpture concept and all students to respond with how they felt during and after lockdown. These responses sent to the sculptor. James will then design a response which involves separate elements for students to create. The design is then shared with student body.

A small group of students (some who have never been on a school trip) were taken to collate primary source material for design work. Photography work and educational talk involved at the Butterfly House in Sheffield.

30th Nov— selected year 7 and year 8 (48 students) participate in a design lesson with me to create individual metallic design elements which contribute to the big sculpture.

During module – smaller groups of upper school students (yr 9 & 10) will create graphics for laser cut elements (12 students in total) They will use industry software to draw these out, and their designs will be sent to the laser cutters to be duplicated to create more decorative elements to the sculpture. As a graphic designer I can deliver this as a bespoke session. The students will email their finished graphic to James themselves.

On 18 Jan, 22 Feb, 22 March and 26 April 2022 – 3 students on each date will participate in a metal making activity at James' workshop – this will be heavily careers based.

The benefits of taking part in this project are vast; Students creative capital will be broadened through the opportunity to work with a real sculptor. James also provided a video about his work & career. Those who have never been on a school trip will broaden their curiosity and cultural capital. Students interested in design/metal work will benefit from a bespoke 60 minute practical session with the artist, again with a careers focus. The older students will learn new ICT skills which will broaden their academic capital & wisdom, whilst becoming aware of the design industry and careers it is used in.

This is very exciting and we can't wait for the finished outcome to be created and installed near the bike rack near the main entrance of school. This will be seen from the main road too in passing. The child; made from metal butterflies; will rust over time whilst the butterflies on wires will stay shiny and capture the light as they move in the breeze. The idea of the butterfly representing freedom, hope and change is something the children are aware of and appreciate. What a legacy to be involved in.

Careers Wisdom

It's been a busy start to my first two modules as Careers and Future You co-ordinator. I have revamped the careers zone and year 8's have had their official tour. We have had guest speakers from the world of nursing, engineering and photography. Year 7-9 have had their first two careers lessons and from feedback received they are finding it useful for planning their future career.

We have launched our new Future You programme with year 9 - 11 during form time. This is a journey of personal discovery where we explore happiness, employability and success. Most sessions have a reflection worksheet so by the end of the academic year everyone will have a record to look back on.

Year 10 and 11 have had post 16 provider assemblies by local sixth form and colleges. Following on from this trips to local sixth forms have been organised for year 11.

A group of year 10 and 11 students were invited to attend the Lincolnshire Health and Care Careers Fair where they were able to speak to professionals from a range of health and care sectors then participate in a workshop of their choosing.

Before we break up for Christmas most year 11's will have had their 1:1 careers interview with our careers advisor. Action plans from these interviews will be emailed to student and parents.



Friends of Pembroke Generosity



The launch event took place in Manchester on 2^{nd} December. Here, three of our four students were able to meet other students from across the country who also have a place on the programme. Every student in the room was incredibly nervous at the start of the day – mixing and interacting with new people is never easy! However, it was amazing to see how all of our students soon came out of their shells and were happily interacting with people they had never met. What was even more pleasing to see was that they did this with a smile on their faces.

At the end of the day, our students were able to spend some time with James as he told them his life story. Hailing from a council estate in Barnsley, he didn't find school easy. However, he found something he was good at in swimming and worked tirelessly at it. He explained how "the only thing you can ever really control is the effort you put in". This is something that really resonated with me and with our students. He explained that if you re determined, driven and disciplined, there is no reason why you cannot achieve whatever goal you set yourself. He was then able to explain the people he has met over


'Becoming Muhammed Ali' by James Patterson
